35 36	CITY MANAGER ITEMS
 37 38 39 40 41 42 	City Manager Carrier shared with Council that the city has been notified by the Property Appraiser's Office of the preliminary gross taxable values for operating purposes this coming fiscal year. The preliminary gross taxable value is \$89, 854, 58. As a result of Amendment 1 passing the city lost six (6) million dollars in taxable value. As a result of portability the city lost \$40,646.

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1 2 3 4 5 6 7 8	The original gross taxable value would have been \$95,438,589. At the next meeting Council will have the DR-420 for action (<i>Report issued by the Property Appraiser's Office listing the gross taxable value of the city. Council sets the millage rate based on this information</i>). This report should give the city a more updated value. City Manager Carrier shared with Council that Marsha Faux is asking all cities to move quickly on their actions and return the DR-420 back to her office. Everything is new this year and Ms. Faux would like to have ample time to report how each city will be affected in the tax revenue cut.
9	City Manager Carrier asked Council's opinion on how to conduct the Budget Workshops this
10	year. Council preferred to have one meeting rather than breaking it out over a number of
11	meetings. City Manager Carrier stated that she would schedule an additional meeting in late July
12	to serve as a Budget Workshop.
13	
14	City Manager Carrier shared with Council that Kevin Claus, contractor for Brandes Design
15	Build, projected the completion of the Cardinal Hill waste water treatment plant to be completed
16	by November 15, 2007. This projection was made approximately one (1) year ago. The plant
17	became substantially complete on May 15, 2008. City Manager Carrier reminded Council that at
18	a previous meeting Council voted to institute liquidated damages if the project was not complete
19	by the November date. The project completion is approximately six (6) month late. The
20	liquidated damages total \$91,000. This amount will be subtracted from his final billing. City
21	Manager Carrier further stated that staff will never recommend Brandes Design Build for any
22	future projects. In her opinion, said company has been extremely difficult to work with.
23	City Manager Corrier informed Council that the Mt. Olive Wester Water and Water Treatment
24 25	City Manager Carrier informed Council that the Mt. Olive Waste Water and Water Treatment
23 26	Plant transfer was successful. The city is operating the system as of June 1, 2008.
20 27	Public Works Director Ronnie Sims shared with Council that the operation of the system is
28	running smoothly thus far. Public Works is handling water connection and disconnections, line
20 29	maintenance for both sewer and water, and miscellaneous work order requests along with various
30	other day to day maintenance.
31	
32	Victoria Silva, Finance Administrator, shared with Council that the necessary meter reading
33	devices have been purchased to read the Mt. Olive water meters. In addition, the company that
34	the items were purchased from will work with the city's current billing software program to
35	bridge the two systems together.
36	Additionally, the city's billing Software Company is uploading all of the Mt. Olive customer
37	account information (approximately 1200 accounts) into the billing program. A new service the
38	city will be offering their utility customers soon is Auto Debit to pay utility bills. So far three
39	hundred and fifty (350) customers have signed up for the new service. The auto debit will
40	eliminate paper bills for those customers, but will create a draft record in the customer's bank
41	account.
42	
43	Councilor Eilertsen asked if a master back up would be done upon completion of loading the

---Councilor Eilertsen asked if a master back up would be done upon completion of loading the
 customer information. City Manager Carrier assured her that master back ups are created nightly

1 2 3	off site with the city's IT Company as well as the software company creating a back up prior to downloading the completed information.
4 5 7 8 9 10 11	Mayor Penton asked Public Works Director Sims, how much time has been added in regards to meter reading by adding the Mt. Olive system. Public Works Director Sims was pleased to share that the entire system, approximately 1200 accounts only took two (2) hours to read because the entire system is supplied by radio read meters. He further shared that it takes staff approximately three and one half (3 1/2) days to read 900 accounts because the majority of the meters are manual or touch read. City Manager Carrier added that the time efficiency of the radio read meters is exactly why she has implemented the meter replacement program, which replaces all manual and touch read with radio read meters.
12 13 14 15 16 17	Public Works Director Sims stated that the downside to this system is the lack of mapping. He explained that the maps for the system are limited and do not depict line locations. He further stated that it will be a work in progress for public works personnel to locate all lines and marking them for future maintenance and possible line repairs.
17 18 19 20 21	Lastly, City Manager Carrier presented Council with miniature versions of the membranes that will be installed to treat wastewater at the Regional Plant. She explained that the actual membranes are eight feet wide and ten feet long.
21 22 23	CITY CLERK ITEMS
24 25	There were none
25 26 27	CITY ATTORNEY ITEMS
28 29 30 31 32	City Attorney Sullivan reiterated what City Manager Carrier already mentioned to Council earlier in the meeting. He shared that in recent days a letter was sent to the attorney of record for Brandes Design Build, informing him/her of the city's intent to institute liquidated damages. He stated that he will pass information along to Council once he has an update.
32 33 34	COUNCIL MEMBER ITEMS
35 36 37	<i>Councilor Adorno</i> - Councilor Adorno was absent, but called City Clerk Sims earlier in the evening in order for City Clerk Sims to relay a couple of suggestion Councilor Adorno had.
38 39 40 41	If Council was to choose a workshop date she preferred the first Saturday in September. Additionally, Councilor Adorno is suggesting choosing an alternate workshop date should weather not permit to hold the workshop on the original date selected.
42 43 44	<i>Councilor Ames-</i> Councilor Ames thanked those in the audience for their presence and their interest in the community.

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Councilor Eilertsen- Councilor Eilertsen stated that she did not have anything to share this 1 2 evening. The only thing she wanted to check on is if Council had a chance to review the 3 information City Clerk Sims gathered for Council upon Councilor Eilertsen's request regarding 4 tuition reimbursement. City Manager Carrier informed Councilor Eilertsen that Vice Mayor 5 Denico prepared a memo regarding the City Clerk's tuition reimbursement, because Vice Mayor 6 Denico was not sure if she would be able to attend tonight's meeting and wanted Council to be 7 aware of her position in this matter. Councilor Eilertsen read the memo aloud for the record. The 8 memo's main point was that personnel items should be left to handle by the City Manager and 9 the Finance Director. In the memo, Vice Mayor Denico asked for Council's support in the matter 10 and to make a motion to leave personnel matters up to the aforementioned.(The complete memo 11 is available for review in the office of the City Clerk during normal business hours). 12 13 ---Some discussion followed. A motion was made by Councilor Ames to accept the memo 14 submitted by Vice Mayor Denico. Mayor Penton seconded the motion. 15 16 ---Prior to the roll call, City Clerk Sims shared with Council that after much consideration and in 17 discussing it with her husband, City Clerk Sims has come to the decision not to submit anything 18 further for reimbursement. She added that she is seeking the degree for herself and not due to a 19 job requirement. She stated that although it will benefit her in her job performance, her ultimate 20 desire is to obtain the degree for herself. She further stated that, in her opinion it will work out better if she does not burden Council with such decisions. 21 22 23 ---Mayor Penton encouraged City Clerk Sims to continue utilizing benefits the city offers. 24 25 Roll Call: Councilor Dan Ames-aye, Councilor Kristin Eilertsen-aye, Mayor Donald Penton-aye, Vice Mayor Chris Denico-aye. 26 27 28 4-ayes 29 0-nays 30 31 **VICE-MAYOR ITEMS** 32 33 ---Vice Mayor Denico inquired about the status of the skate park and the pocket park in the 34 Railroad Heights area. City Manager Carrier informed Vice Mayor Denico that staff is waiting on quotes for fencing to complete the skate park. The playground equipment for the pocket park 35 36 has been ordered and a reimbursement request has been submitted to CDBG (Community 37 Development Block Grant) as the pocket park is a grant project. City Manager Carrier also 38 shared that it was brought to her attention that residence would like some shade trees planted 39 around the playground equipment at Freedom Park and to create an area for young teens as well. 40 City Manager Carrier continued by stating, that she would try to budget those items in next years 41 budget as they are very good ideas. 42 43 **MAYOR ITEMS**

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---Mayor Penton thanked those present for coming and the city staff for doing a great job. In 1 2 addition, he encouraged employees to bring forth any issues they may have to their supervisor or 3 the City Manager. He extended this sentiment to the citizens as well, asking them to bring their 4 concerns to the City Manager. Mayor Penton stated that he wants to keep the citizens of Polk 5 City happy to the best of Council's and Managements ability. 6 7 ---City Manager Carrier extended her gratitude to Council for allowing her to miss last month's 8 meeting to tend to personal matters. She stated that she appreciated Council's tolerance. 9 10 **PUBLIC REQUESTS** 11 12 ---None were submitted, however, Mayor Penton opened the floor for anyone present to speak. 13 Mayor Penton stated that he received a phone call from a resident today and encouraged him to 14 come forward and voice his concerns. Sylvain Hamel of 130 Carter Blvd, Polk City Fl, 33868 15 addressed Council and stated the following concerns: 16 17 4 The drainage pipe designed to drain storm water into a nearby retention pond is half full 18 of sand and causes his driveway to flood due to poor drainage. 19 \downarrow He received the letter sent out by the city informing property owners near the Polk City 20 Center that said center has applied for a variance. The Polk City Center is requesting to place a sign on city right of way on SR33 to advertise the business location on Carter 21 22 Blvd. Mr. Hamel strongly opposes this request as he feels that if the variance was granted 23 it would open the door for other businesses to follow suit. In his opinion, it would undo the effort of beautifying the city. 24 4 The roads in his neighborhood are damaged due to semi trucks traveling through. He 25 pointed out that a nearby neighbor parks and works on his semi trucks in the yard. 26 27 4 Mr. Hamel stated that the movable basket ball goals pose a serious hazard. Mr. Hamel is 28 employed as a Fire Fighter through Polk County and serves out of the Polk City Station. 29 He continued by stating that during a local call the fire truck could not get through to the 30 location of the call as quickly as needed due to basket ball goals blocking the road way. 31 He wanted to remind everyone that one day it could be their home on fire and getting 32 there quickly is important. 33 He asked if Polk City had a curfew for children. He has serious problems with children in 34 the neighborhood being out at 1 am skate boarding and using profane language and when 35 approaching them and asking them to go home due to the lateness of the hour he is being 36 threatened with violence. He stated that he has contacted the Sheriff's office a number of 37 times but by the time the deputy arrives the children often times have moved on. 38 4 He stated that he was under the impression that the Polk City Center was required to 39 install a buffer of some sort between his home and the location of the business. To date 40 no buffer has been installed. Mr. Hamel feels that between the business next door and the 41 noise created by his neighbor working on his semi trucks, his quality of life is being 42 compromised. At this point, he is considering moving out of Polk City. 43 44 ---City Manager Carrier offered some insight and resolutions to his concerns; they are as follows:

1	
2	4 The Honey Bee neighborhood has a poor drainage design. The city only has utility
3	easements in the area and is prohibited to clean the few existing ditches as they are
4	deemed private property. However, during the installation of sewer lines the city plans to
5	correct drainage issues in this neighborhood. City Manager Carrier mentioned that in the
6	past the City tried to enlist the Fire Stations help by blowing out the drain pipe but was
7	not able receive the station's help.
8	4 City Manager Carrier explained to Mr. Hamel that when a variance request is submitted
9	the city is required by law to hold a hearing. Holding the hearing does not automatically
10	grant the variance. City Manager Carrier encouraged Mr. Hamel to attend the upcoming
11	meeting (Zoning Board of Appeals, July 8, 2008 6:30pm, Polk City Government Center,
12	123 Broadway Blvd. SE, Polk City Fl 33868) and share his concerns with the Board at
13	that time.
14	The semi truck issue will be turned over to Code Enforcement.
15	4 The movable basket ball goal issue has been brought up by Councilor Eilertsen at a
16	pervious meeting and turned over to Sgt. Cone.
17	4 City Manager Carrier shared with Mr. Hamel that the curfew applies to children under
18	the age of seventeen (17). She encouraged Mr. Hamel to continue calling the deputies and
19	if possible find out where the children reside.
20	City Manager Carrier stated that she will follow up with the building department as she
21 22	agreed that a buffer should be installed between Mr. Hamel's home and the City Center.
22	This can be accomplished in the form of landscaping or fencing.
23 24	Mr. Hamel thanked Council and Management for the opportunity to bring is concerns to light.
25	with manier manked Council and Management for the opportunity to omig is concerns to right.
26	Mayor Penton stated that a letter would be sent to Mr. Hamel addressing his concerns.
27	The for a content stated that a fetter would be sent to this framer addressing his concerns.
28	Councilor Eilertsen asked City Manager Carrier what the hours of operation were for the Code
29	Enforcement Department. City Manager Carrier replied that the Code Enforcement Officer
30	adjusts her schedule as necessary to meet the need of the city.
31	
32	Mr. Douthit, General Manager of Fantasy of Flight, offered help to bring the skate park project
33	to fruition. He stated that he had six foot chain link fencing he could donate. City Manager
34	Carrier stated that the city would prefer to install eight – ten foot fencing to avoid basket balls
35	from bouncing over the fence into the skate park (currently the tennis courts).
36	
37	Council was very appreciative of Mr. Douthit's offer of help and stated that anything he could do
38	to help would be welcomed.
39

10	information to Mr. Denico and making it possible for Mr. Denico to take the Cub Scouts to the
11	property owned by the city off Citrus Grove Blvd. She stated that the Cub Scouts were very
12	excited.

14	* Juli McShay of the Polk County School Board invited all of Council to attend the upcoming
15	Annual School Summit.
